1 and opinions of the students I represent. I will, to the best of my ability, perform the
2 duties of my office, and that I will promote the worth and value of the University of
3 Arkansas at Monticello.”
4

5 **SECTION 5. DUTIES**

6
7 The duties of the Student Government Association shall be:

8
9 *i.* To serve as the governing body of the student body of the University of
10 Arkansas at Monticello.

11
12 *ii.* To actively establish and execute programs and projects that are beneficial to
13 the students

14
15 *iii.* To serve as the official channel of communication with the faculty and
16 administration, and with all levels of government with respect to the needs,
17 wishes and opinions of the student body.

18
19 *iv.* To ensure fair and active representation in the various decision making
20 functions of our campus by appointing qualified students to faculty-student and
21 administrative committees, and to the UAM Assembly committees, subject to
22 administrative approval.

23
24 *v.* To establish committees, outside of the appointments in Article II, sections, to
25 address issues around campus that affect the entire student body.

26
27 *vi.* To promote and improve relations between the community of Monticello,
28 Arkansas and the students of the University of Arkansas at Monticello.

29
30 *vii.* To exclusively supervise, conduct, and publicize all campus wide student
31 elections.
32

33 **Article II. EXECUTIVE BRANCH**

34 **SECTION 1. THE CABINET**

35
36
37 (a) The Executive Branch of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student
38 Government Association shall consist of the Cabinet. The Cabinet’s members shall be
39 four officers elected by the student body at-large in Spring elections, as described in this
40 Constitution; namely the President of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student
41 Government Association, Vice-President of the University of Arkansas at Monticello
42 Student Government Association, Secretary of the University of Arkansas at Monticello
43 Student Government Association, and Treasurer of the University of Arkansas at
44 Monticello Student Government Association.

45
46 (b) The primary purpose of the Cabinet is to aid and assist the Student Government
47 Association Senate in the establishment of policies and programs and to assist in the

1 execution of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government Association
2 functions.

3
4 (c) The Cabinet must hold a meeting within ten days of the first day of classes (excluding
5 Saturday & Sunday) and at least one meeting per month thereafter for the remainder of
6 the semester, in which all students are allowed to attend. The Cabinet shall meet at the
7 call of the President.

8
9 (d) All executive officers, before he/she enters on the execution of respective office,
10 he/she must be certified by the Election Commission under the rules of this Constitution
11 and must take the Oath, or Affirmation, of Office, as described in this Constitution.

12 13 **SECTION 2. THE PRESIDENT**

14
15 (a) The President of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government
16 Association shall hold his/her office for one year term, for the same term period as all
17 other executive officers; and be elected with the Vice-President as one ticket.

18
19 (b) To be eligible for the Office of President a student must be enrolled as, and maintain,
20 full time student status, as set by the Office of the Registrar, must have completed a
21 minimum of thirty-six semester hours prior to election to office, must attend at least ten
22 Student Government Association meetings (included but not limited to: Executive Board
23 meetings, Student Activities Board meetings, Senate meetings, etc.) per semester for two
24 semesters concurring, prior to election to office, and must have, and maintain while
25 serving, a cumulative grade point average of a 2.75.

26
27 (c) The President shall have power:

28
29 *i.* To veto any legislation of the Senate by returning it to the Senate with a
30 statement of the President's Objectives. If any legislation shall not be returned by
31 the President within ten class days (excluding Saturdays & Sundays) after it shall
32 have been presented to him/her, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if
33 he/she had signed it, unless the Senate by their adjournment, for the end of the
34 semester, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be law.

35
36 *ii.* To appoint student members to UAM Assembly Committees in compliance to
37 Assembly By-Laws; with the majority approval of the Cabinet.

38
39 *iii.* To appoint vacancies in the Senate, with the consent of the majority of the
40 Senate.

41
42 *iv.* To appoint student members to the University Judicial Board in compliance to
43 the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Handbook, with the majority
44 approval of the Cabinet.

45
46 *v.* To appoint vacancies in the Secretary and Treasurer positions of the Cabinet,
47 with the consent of the majority of the Senate.

1 vi. To appoint one third of the Supreme Court, with the majority approval of the
2 Cabinet.

3
4 vii. To appoint three Senate members to the Student Activities Board, with the
5 consent of the majority of the Senate.

6
7 (d) The duties of the President shall be:

8 i. To carry out the legislative intent of the Senate.

9
10 ii. To be the official Student Government Association representative at all
11 University and other official functions, and to maintain relations with other
12 student governments.

13 iii. To work with the Treasurer concerning the Student Government Association
14 finances.

15 iv. To ensure that the Student Government Association Constitution is enforced,
16 upheld, and strictly followed.

17
18 v. To perform all other duties normally executed by the President of any
19 organization in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised.

20
21 vi. To recommend and initiate legislation before the Senate. The president does
22 not have an official vote on legislative amendments.

23

25
26
27 **SECTION 3. THE VICE-PRESIDENT**

28
29 (a) The Vice-President of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government
30 Association shall hold his/her office for one year term, and be for the same term period as
31 all other executive officers; and be elected with the President as one ticket.

32
33 (b) To be eligible for the Office of Vice-President a student must be enrolled as, and
34 maintain, full time student status, as set by the Office of the Registrar, must have
35 completed a minimum of thirty-six semester hours prior to election to office, must attend
36 at least ten Student Government Association meetings (included but not limited to:
37 Executive Board meetings, Student Activities Board meetings, Senate meetings, etc.) per
38 semester for two semesters concurring, prior to election to office, and must have, and
39 maintain while serving, a cumulative grade point average of a 2.75.

40
41 (c) The Vice-President shall have power:

42 i. To fill the office of the President in the President's absence.

43 ii. To have one vote in the Senate, only when a tie has occurred.

44
45 (d) The duties of the Vice-President shall be:

- 1 i. To replace the President in the event that the President is unable to complete
2 his/her term.
3
4 ii. To be responsible for the publicizing of all Student Government Association
5 events through the establishment of a publicity committee.
6
7 iii. To perform other duties as assigned by the President.
8

9 **SECTION 4. THE SECRETARY**

10
11 (a) The Secretary of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government
12 Association shall hold his/her office for one year term, and be for the same term period as
13 all other executive officers.
14

15 (b) To be eligible for the Office of Secretary a student must be enrolled as, and maintain,
16 full time student status, as set by the Office of the Registrar, must have completed a
17 minimum of thirty-six semester hours prior to election to office, must attend at least ten
18 Student Government Association meetings (included but not limited to: Executive Board
19 meetings, Student Activities Board meetings, Senate meetings, etc.) per semester for two
20 semesters concurring, prior to election to office, and must have, and maintain while
21 serving, a cumulative grade point average of a 2.75.
22

23 (c) The duties of the Secretary shall be:

24
25 *i.* To maintain accurate and complete records for the Student Government
26 Association meetings, including attendance records.
27

28 *ii.* To prepare and publish the minutes and agenda, after approval by the Student
29 Government Association executive meeting, and to file a copy in the Student
30 Government office.
31

32 *iii.* To assist the Director of Student Programs and Activities to ensure all Student
33 Organizations are in compliance with updated rosters and forms. All paperwork
34 for each organization must be on file with the Student Programs and Activities
35 Office.
36

37 *iv.* To operate the Student Government office as directed by the President.
38

39 *v.* to perform other duties assigned by the President.
40

41 **SECTION 5. THE TREASURER**

42
43 (a) The Treasurer of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government
44 Association shall hold his/her office for one year term, and be for the same term period as
45 all other executive officers.
46

47 (b) To be eligible for the Office of Treasurer a student must be enrolled as, and maintain,
48 full time student status, as set by the Office of the Registrar, must have completed a

1 minimum of thirty-six semester hours prior to election to office, must attend at least ten
2 Student Government Association meetings (included but not limited to: Executive Board
3 meetings, Student Activities Board meetings, Senate meetings, etc.) per semester for two
4 semesters concurring, prior to election to office, and must have, and maintain while
5 serving, a cumulative grade point average of a 2.75.
6

7 (c) The duties of the Treasurer shall be:
8

9 *i.* To work with the President in handling and recording financial expenditures,
10 and reporting to the Student Senate on the financial status of the Student
11 Government Association at least once a month.
12

13 *ii.* To work with the Student Activities Board in handling and recording financial
14 expenditures, and reporting to the Student Senate on the Financial status of the
15 Student Activities Board; or as deemed necessary by the Student Activities Board
16 Chairperson.
17

18 *iii.* To prepare a budget in which to be approved by the Cabinet and the Senate for
19 each semester.
20

21 *iv.* To sign all budgetary documents.
22

23 *v.* To perform other duties assigned by the President.
24

25 **SECTION 6. OTHER ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS**

26
27 The President may nominate and with the approval of the Cabinet and the Senate by a
28 majority of the vote of both bodies respectfully, may appoint, other administrative
29 officers for the current Administration, to assist in the administration of Student
30 Government Association programs and in the operation of the Student Government
31 office. The nomination of any person to such a position must be accompanied by a job
32 description.
33

34 **SECTION 7. VOTING**

35
36 The Cabinet shall have only four regular members, namely the executive officers, named
37 in Article II, Section 1 of this Constitution, each member receiving one vote. However, in
38 the event of a tie, the Chairperson of the Student Activities Board shall have one vote, in
39 that single occurrence.
40

41 **Article III. LEGISLATIVE BRANCH**

42 **SECTION 1. THE SENATE**

43
44 (a) The Legislative Branch of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student
45 Government Association shall consist of the Senate.
46
47

1 (b) The Senate shall be composed of two Senators elected form each department (a
2 Position I and a Position II) within in University; with Position I being elected in the Fall
3 election, as described in this Constitution, and Position II, being elected in the Spring
4 election, as described in this Constitution. There shall be also five Senators elected by the
5 student body at-large (a Position I, II, III, IV, V); with Position I and II being elected in
6 the Fall election, as described in this Constitution, and Position II, IV, V being elected in
7 the Spring election, as described in this Constitution. A Senate term shall consist of a
8 one-year period following Senator’s respective election to office.
9

10 (c) The primary purpose of the Senate is to initiate legislation in the Student Government
11 Association, aid and assist the Cabinet and Student Activities Board in the establishment
12 of policies and programs and to act as the voice of the student in the Student Government
13 Association.
14

15 (d) The Senate must hold a meeting within ten class days of the first day of classes and at
16 least one meeting per month thereafter for the remainder of the semester, in which all
17 students are allowed to attend. Regular meetings must be scheduled at the first meeting of
18 a semester, and notification must be made to all students before the next regular meeting.
19

20 (e) The Senate at its first meeting must elect, from its members, a President Pro-Tempore
21 of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government Association Senate, a
22 Secretary of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government Association
23 Senate, a Clerk of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government
24 Association Senate, and a Parliamentarian of the University of Arkansas at Monticello
25 Student Government Association Senate.
26

27 (f) All Senators, before he/she enters on the execution of respective Office, he/she must
28 be certified by the Election Commission under the rules of this Constitution and must
29 take the Oath, or Affirmation, of Office, as described in this Constitution.
30

31 (g) The Senate may adopt a set of By-laws in which shall deal exclusively with the
32 functions and structure of the Senate as not expressly stated in this Constitution, and not
33 in contradiction to this Constitution.
34

35 **SECTION 2. SENATOR QUALIFICATIONS**

36
37 To be eligible for a position as a Senator a student must be enrolled as, and maintain, a
38 full time student status, as set by the Office of the Registrar, must have completed a
39 minimum of twenty-four semester hours prior to election to office, must attend at least
40 five Student Government Association meetings (including but not limited to: Executive
41 Board meetings, Student Activities Board meetings, Senate meetings, etc.) per semester
42 for two semesters concurring, prior to election to office, and must have, and maintain
43 while serving, a cumulative grade point average of a 2.50.
44

45 **SECTION 3. VACANCIES**

46
47 In the event that a Senator is unable to complete his/her term, the President of the Student
48 Government Association shall appoint a replacement with majority approval of the

1 Senate. The President's Senate appointees must qualify to be a Senator, as described in
2 this Constitution.

3
4 **SECTION 4. THE PRESIDENT PRO-TEMPORE**

5
6 (a) The President Pro-Tempore of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student
7 Government Association Senate shall hold his/her office for one semester term.

8
9 (b) The President Pro-Tempore shall have power

10
11 *i.* To preside over the Senate

12
13 *ii.* To appoint committee members and chairs in the Senate

14
15 *iii.* To fill the office of the Vice-President in the Vice President's absence

16
17 (c) The duties of the President Pro-Tempore shall be:

18
19 *i.* To set the legislative agenda

20
21 *ii.* To represent the Senate at functions and events

22
23 *iii.* To work with the Student Activities Board and the Cabinet in financial and
24 legislative matters

25
26 **SECTION 5. OTHER OFFICERS**

27
28 The Senate may create other offices within the Senate. The powers and duties of all other
29 offices not included in the Constitution must be included in the Senate By-laws but may
30 not contradict this Constitution.

31
32 **SECTION 6. LEGISLATION**

33
34 (a) The Senate shall have the power to pass, with majority vote of the Senate and
35 approval of the President: Enactments, Resolutions, and Petitions

36
37 *i.* Enactments shall deal with legislative proposals that do not need to be
38 sanctioned by any other authority other than the Student Government Association,
39 (which include but are not limited to: budgets, creation programs, initiations of
40 actions, etc).

41
42 *ii.* Resolutions shall deal with any subject that the Student Government wishes to
43 address and make public as its opinion

44
45 *iii.* Petitions shall deal with matters upon which the Student Government
46 Association wishes to express its views and that require action or support of a
47 higher authority (i.e., Vice-Chancellor of Student Affairs, Provost, Chancellor,
48 UAM Assembly, etc.)

1
2 (b) All legislation for raising or spending of Student Government Association funds shall
3 originate in the Senate
4

5 (c) Every Bill which shall have passed in the Senate, shall before it becomes Law, be
6 presented to the President of the Student Government Association. If the President
7 approves of the legislation he/she shall sign it, but if not, the President may veto the
8 legislation
9

10 (d) To veto any legislation of the Senate, the President may, return it to the Senate with a
11 statement of the Presidents Objectives. If any legislation shall not be returned by the
12 President within ten class days after it shall have been presented to him/her, the same
13 shall be a Law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Senate by their
14 adjournment, for the end of the semester, prevent it's return in which case it shall not be a
15 law.
16

17 (e) The Senate shall have power to override a President's veto, with two-thirds vote of the
18 entire membership of the Senate.
19

20 (f) In the event of a tie vote on legislation in the Senate, the Vice-President shall be given
21 one vote, only in that occurrence.
22

23 **SECTION 7. OTHER POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE SENATE**

24

25 (a) The Senate shall have power:

26
27 *i.* To approve all Budgetary matters of the Student Government Association

28
29 *ii.* To appoint one third of the Student Activities Board.

30
31 *iii.* To approve all Presidential appointments to the Senate and the Cabinet

32
33 *iv.* To initiate legislation in the Student Government Association
34

35 **Article IV. JUDICIAL BRANCH**

36

37 **SECTION 1. SUPREME COURT**

38

39 (a) The Judicial Branch of the University of Arkansas at Monticello Student Government
40 Association shall consist of the Supreme Court.
41

42 (b) The Supreme Court shall consist of the two students members and one faculty
43 member appointed from each of the other branches of the Student Government
44 Association (i.e., the Cabinet, the Senate, and the Student Activities Board), respectively.
45

46 (c) The primary purpose of the Supreme Court is to ensure that officers, Senators, and
47 Student Activities Board members are committed to their task, and to see that their duties
48 are carried out to the best of their abilities.

1
2 (d) The Supreme Court must hold a meeting within ten class days of the first day of
3 classes (excluding Saturdays & Sundays) and at least one meeting per month thereafter
4 for the remainder of the semester, in which all students are allowed to attend. The
5 Supreme Court shall meet at the call of the Chief Justice.
6

7 **SECTION 2. CHIEF JUSTICE**

8

9 (a) The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall hold his/her office for one year term, be
10 elected by the members of the Supreme Court in the Spring before the first day in May.
11

12 (b) The Chief Justice duties shall be:

13 *i.* To file and organize hearings.

14 *ii.* To inform other branches of the Student Government Association of judgment.

15 *iii.* To insure the procedure of the Supreme Court is conducted in a fair and
16 nondiscriminatory manner.
17
18

20

21 **SECTION 3. CLAIM AGAINST OFFICIALS**

22

23 (a) Any Student Government Association official who shall be accused of conduct
24 inconsistent with just and equitable principles or of misconduct or of willfully violating
25 the Student Government Association Constitution, the By-laws of the respective branch,
26 or UAM Student Handbook, or any other rules of the University may have charges made
27 against them through the Supreme Court procedure laid out in this constitution.
28

29 (b) If a complaint is made against a Student Government Association official, it must be
30 addressed to the Supreme Court, specifying the particular act complained of together with
31 all the documentary evidence bearing on the case, and signed. If a student is filing a
32 complaint against an Student Government Association official, the complaint must be
33 signed by at least five Student Government Association officials and ten students; if a
34 Student Government Association official is filing against another official the complaint
35 must be signed by at least ten students; each signature must be accompanied by a
36 paragraph statement of support and a swearing to testify in a public hearing. Once the
37 complaint has been filed with the Chief Justice the case must be signed by three justices
38 (two being students and one being faculty; and each justices not being appointed from the
39 same branch). After the case being signed by three justices of appropriate qualifications,
40 the Chief Justice shall cause copies of the complaint to be served on the member
41 complained of; and it shall be the duty of said member, within ten days (excluding
42 Saturdays & Sundays) of the receipt of the same, to return them to the Supreme Court
43 with his/her written answer to the complaint, and all documents bearing on the case in
44 his/her possession, with the names of witnesses whom he/she desires shall be summoned.
45 The Chief Justice shall, as soon as expedient, after receipt of said answer, or if no answer
46 is received after the expiration of ten days (excluding Saturdays & Sundays) from the
47 service of the copies of complaint, notify both parties and the witnesses named of the
48 time and place at which the signed Justices will hold a hearing to act on said case. If, after

1 the examination, signed Justices deem the charges substantiated, they shall so report their
2 judgment to the member complained of's respective body and deliver to the Director of
3 Student Programs and Activities all documents relating thereto. The Director of Student
4 Programs and Activities will carry out all action of herein nature.
5

6 **SECTION 4. JUDGMENT**

7

8 Judgment in all cases shall not extend further than removal or suspension from office,
9 and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the
10 Student Government Association: but the official convicted shall nevertheless be liable
11 and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to policy of the
12 University of Arkansas at Monticello.
13

14 **SECTION 5. DEMERITS**

15

16 (a) To insure proper conduct of all Student Government Association officials, a demerit
17 system will be established.
18

19 (b) Demerits will be collected by an official designated by each respective branch of the
20 Student Government Association (i.e., the Cabinet, the Senate, and the Student Activities
21 Board). After an official collects seven demerits the branch will report to the Supreme
22 Court and file a complaint against that official without having to collect signatures. At the
23 end of each term an official's demerits will be forgiven.
24

25 (c) Demerits shall be awarded based on the following guidelines:
26

27 *i.* One demerit for tardiness (i.e., attending a meeting but not being present at the
28 Call of Roll).
29

30 *ii.* One demerit for missing a committee meeting.
31

32 *iii.* One demerit for disrespect to another Student Government Association
33 officials or University official.
34

35 *iv.* Two demerits for attending less than twenty minutes of a general meeting.
36

37 *v.* One demerit for failing to assist or attend a Student Government Association
38 sponsored event.
39

40 *vi.* Three demerits for an unexcused absence.
41

42 (d) All Student Government Association officials shall have right to appeal demerits
43 awarded, in a complaint to the Supreme Court against the official in charge of
44 designating demerits for his/her respective body.
45

46 (e) The Student Government Association shall define disrespect as: "the lack of holding
47 someone or something in high or special regard; or not recognizing a person's or object's
48 quality of self worth." (Merriam-Webster: accessed 02/25/09)

1
2 **SECTION 6. APPEALS**
3

4 All Student Government Association officials that are suspended or expelled from their
5 respective body for any reason, they may appeal the decision of the Supreme Court by filling
6 an appeal with the Office of the Vice-Chancellor of Student Affairs via Director of Student
7 Programs and Activities.
8

9 **Article V. STUDENT ACTIVITIES BOARD**
10

11 **SECTION 1. THE BOARD**
12

13 (a) The Student Activities Board shall consist of the Chairperson of the Student Activities
14 Board, seven student members elected by the student body at-large, three President
15 appointed Senators, and the Director of Student Programs and Activities as an ex-officio
16 member
17

18 (b) The primary purpose of the Student Activities Board is to create, coordinate, and/or
19 produce an environment in which quality, variety, and well coordinated activities may be
20 presented for student involvement at the University of Arkansas at Monticello, through
21 obtaining revenues from or for student activities.
22

23 (c) The Student Activities Board must hold a meeting within ten class days of the first
24 day of classes and at least one meeting per week thereafter for the remainder of the
25 semester, in which all students are allowed to attend. The Student Activities Board shall
26 meet at the call of the Chairperson.
27

28 (d) All Student Activities Board members, before he/she enters on the execution of
29 respective Office, he/she must be certified by the Election Commission under the rules of
30 this Constitution and must take the Oath, or Affirmation, of Office, as described in this
31 Constitution.
32

33 (e) The Student Activities Board may adopt a set of By-laws in which shall deal
34 exclusively with the functions and structure of the Student Activities Board as not
35 expressly stated in this Constitution, and not in contradiction to this Constitution.
36

37 **SECTION 2. THE CHAIRPERSON**
38

39 (a) The Chairperson of the Student Activities Board shall hold his/her office for one year
40 term, be elected by the student body at-large in the Spring election, as described in this
41 Constitution.
42

43 (b) To be eligible for the Office of Chairperson a student must be enrolled as, and
44 maintain, a full time student status as set by the Office of the Registrar, must have
45 completed a minimum of thirty-six semester hours prior to election to office, must attend
46 at least ten Student Government Association meetings (including but not limited to
47 Executive Board meetings, Student Activities Board meetings, Senate meetings etc.) per

1 semester for two semesters concurring, prior to the election to office, and must have and
2 maintain while serving, a cumulative grade point average of a 2.75.
3

4 (d) The Chairperson shall have power:

5
6 *i.* To preside over the Student Activities Board

7
8 *ii.* To have one vote in the Cabinet, only when a tie has occurred.
9

10 (e) The duties of the Chairperson shall be:

11
12 *i.* To work with the Director of Student Programs and Activities and Vice-
13 Chancellor of Student Affairs on matters of planning and scheduling activities on
14 campus.

15
16 *ii.* To insure quality, variety, and well-coordinated activities are presented for
17 student involvement on campus.
18

19 **SECTION 3. STUDENT MEMBERS**

20
21 To be eligible for a position as a student member of the Student Activities Board, a
22 student must be enrolled as, and maintain, a full time student status, as set by the Office
23 of the Registrar, must have completed a minimum of twenty-four semester hours prior to
24 election to office, must attend at least five Student Government Association meetings
25 (including but not limited to: Executive Board meetings, Student Activities Board
26 meetings, Senate meetings, etc.) per semester for two semesters concurring, prior to
27 election to office, and must have, and maintain while serving, a cumulative grade point
28 average of a 2.50.
29

30 **SECTION 4. ORGANIZATIONAL REPRESENTATIVES**

31
32 (a) Each active organization, as registered with the Office of Student Programs and
33 Activities, on campus may send an official Student Government Association
34 Representatives to be an ex-officio member of the Student Activities Board
35

36 (b) Student Government Association Representatives, as ex-officio members, shall be
37 given complete right to serve on Student Activities Board committees and to express their
38 opinion on matters of the Student Activities Board.
39

40 **SECTION 5. VACANCIES**

41
42 In the event there is a vacancy on the Student Activities Board, the remaining members of
43 the Student Activities Board shall take nominations to fulfill the position from one of the
44 Student Government Association Representatives. The Student Government Association
45 Representative elected by the majority vote of the Student Activities Board, must be
46 qualified to be a member of the Student Activities Board, as described in this
47 Constitution. Once elected as a member of the Student Activities Board, the student
48 Government Association Representative shall be given all privileges of a Student

1 Activities Board member; and the organization in which the Student Government
2 Association Representative represented must elect a new representative to the Student
3 Government Association.
4

5 **SECTION 6. COMMITTEES**

6
7 (a) The Student Activities Board shall have power to create and maintain committees to
8 assist in the creation, coordination, and/or production of student programs and the
9 functions of the Board.
10

11 (b) The Student Activities Board shall have, but not limited to, four standing committees,
12 namely:

13
14 *i.* A Standing Committee on Student Relations, to work with the Voice, UAM
15 Media Services, and other media entities to promote all Student Activities Board
16 programs and activities; and to work with other student organizations in the
17 creation, coordination, and/or production student programs and activities. The
18 Standing Committee on Student Relations shall have two Sub-committees: a
19 Standing Sub-committee on Advertising and a Standing Sub-committee on Public
20 Relations.
21

22 *ii.* A Standing Committee on Athletic Programs, to assist in the creation,
23 coordination, and/or production of programs and activities that increase student
24 involvement and awareness in UAM Athletics and Intramurals Sports.
25

26 *iii.* A Standing Committee on Research, to conduct research and information for
27 the creation, coordination, and/or production of student programs and activities.
28

29 *iv.* A Standing Committee on Special Events, to assist in the creation,
30 coordination, and/or production of film showings, travel programs, Homecoming,
31 Parents' Day, Weevil Welcome Day, Crawfish Boil, etc., and any other activities
32 that do not fall within another area of responsibility.
33

34 **Article VI. ELECTIONS**

35 **SECTION 1. ELECTION COMMISSION**

36
37
38 (a) All Student Government Association elections shall be managed by the Election
39 Commission.
40

41 (b) The Election Commission shall consist of five members chosen by the Senate and
42 who are not running for any elected office or two University professional staff members
43 appointed by the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs, in the event no student commission
44 is put together. The Election Commission will be chaired by a Commissioner of Elections
45 to insure the duties of the Election Commission are carried out.
46

47 (c) The duties of the Election Commission shall be:
48

- 1 *i.* To establish the times and places of all elections according to the guidelines of
2 the Constitution.
- 3
- 4 *ii.* To provide for poll workers for the election and to ensure the security of ballots
5 and the ballot boxes.
- 6
- 7 *iii.* To count the votes of the election.
- 8
- 9 *iv.* To enforce all election rules and guidelines.
- 10
- 11 *v.* To hear and decide upon any and all protests and possible violations.
- 12
- 13 *vi.* To determine the consequences for election rules violations.
- 14
- 15 *vii.* To receive financial disclosures from all candidates, and to verify their
16 expenditures.
- 17
- 18 *viii.* To certify election results after all protests and violations have been resolved.
- 19
- 20 *ix.* To report to the Student Government Association on any and all election
21 matters.
- 22

23 **SECTION 2. FILING FOR OFFICE**

24

25 (a) In order to appear on the ballot, a candidate filing for executive office must obtain the
26 signature of fifty students on a form provided by the Election Commission. All
27 candidates must sign an agreement recognizing that the Election Commission is the
28 authority over Student Government Association elections, and the Commission's
29 decisions can be appealed to the Senate. In addition, a candidate filing for office must
30 sign an agreement acknowledging he/she has read Article VI of this Constitution
31 concerning the rules and regulations involved in the election process.

32

33 (b) Candidates must also agree to disclose their campaign expenditures, and make them
34 available for verification by the Commission.

35

36 (c) The filing period will close one week prior to the beginning of elections. An
37 acknowledgement of having read Article VI of this Constitution must be turned in the
38 Election Commission by candidates prior to the end of the filing period.

39

40 (d) If any office is not filled, the newly elected President will then fill the vacancy in
41 accordance with this Constitution.

42

43 **SECTION 3. VOTE REQUIRED FOR ELECTION**

44

45 (a) The candidate that receives the plurality of the ballots cast shall be elected to that
46 office.

47

1 (b) Ballots will be invalid if votes are cast for more than one candidate for each of the
2 offices.

3
4 (c) Write-in votes are permitted for any at-large office. However, write-in votes must
5 conform to the election rules set down by the Election Commission and this Constitution
6 and write-in candidates must fulfill all eligibility requirements noted elsewhere in this
7 Constitution in order to assume office.
8

9 **SECTION 4. ESTABLISHED ELECTION RULES**

10
11 (a) The election will take place over three consecutive days for students to cast their
12 ballots. For each of the three voting days the poll shall be at a different location.

13
14 (b) All students voting must present a valid UAM ID card.

15
16 (c) There shall be a limit of \$100.00 in personal expenditures and \$100.00 in
17 organizational donations per candidate. Each candidate shall fill out a campaign
18 expenditure form, and sign a release authorizing the election commission to verify all
19 expenditures and amounts. If a candidate receives any free goods or services to which the
20 others in that race do not have access, the values of those goods and/or services will be
21 counted against his/her campaign limit.

22
23 *i.* Organizational donations shall be defined as any funds, goods and/or service
24 collected by a registered candidate from an active organization, as registered with
25 the Office of Student Programs and Activities, on campus.

26
27 *ii.* Personal expenditures shall be defined as any funds, goods and/or service
28 collected by a registered candidate from a single person or the candidate
29 themselves.
30

31 (d) Any candidate found campaigning in an academic class will be removed from the
32 ballot and will be ineligible for any office in that election.

33
34 *i.* Campaigning shall be defined as any method of actively soliciting votes such as
35 making speeches, and distributing literature, fliers, cards, posters, electronic
36 communication and social networking mediums, or other campaign paraphernalia.
37

38 (e) No campaigning is allowed within a fifty foot vicinity of the polls during the election.
39 Poll workers may not wear or display any campaign paraphernalia or actively campaign
40 for candidates while working at the polls. Voters will be asked to remove campaign
41 paraphernalia while voting.
42

43 (f) Campaigning will begin no earlier than ten days (excluding Saturdays & Sundays)
44 prior to the election. The specific date will be declared by the Election Commission.
45

46 (g) Candidates may not place any literature (fliers, cards, posters, etc.) inside classrooms,
47 on automobiles (except for their own), utility poles, trees, entrance doors to University

1 facilities, or any other area deemed inappropriate by the Director of Student Programs
2 and Activities or the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs.

3
4 (h) In the event of a tie in an election race the two candidates in which received the
5 highest and same number of votes, shall meet in a location decided by the Director of
6 Student Programs and Activities. In the event of a tie in an election, the tie will be broken
7 by the toss of a coin conducted by the Director of Student Programs and Activities.

8
9 (i) Elections must be held at least ten class days (excluding Saturdays & Sundays) before
10 the last day of class per semester.

11 **SECTION 5. COMPLAINTS**

12
13
14 (a) All complaints, disputes, and official protests will be handled by the Director of
15 Student Programs and Activities. All contests of the election must be received in writing
16 prior to the election results being certified by the Vice-Chancellor for Student Affairs or
17 his/her designee.

18
19 (b) Should an election commission be established through the Student Senate they must
20 follow the following guidelines: After the filing of a complaint or discovery of a
21 violation, the Commission shall schedule a hearing according to the Senate Bylaws. All
22 interested parties, and all involved parties, will be notified of the time and place for the
23 hearing. Decisions of the commission will be made by a majority vote. There must be at
24 least three members of the commission present and voting for any decision to be valid.
25 The following sanctions are available to the commission:

26
27 *i.* Formal reprimand, for violations of non-serious nature.

28 *ii.* Invalidation of the election and the ordering of a new election for major
29 violations and for problems pertaining to the administration of the election that
30 potentially could alter the outcome.

31
32 *iii.* Removal of the candidate from the ballot or elected position, for major
33 violations, which have occurred during the election process.

34
35 *iv.* Any combination of the above sanctions that the election commission may
36 desire to impose.

37
38 (c) The decision of the election commission will be upheld or overturned by majority
39 vote in the Senate of the members present and voting.

40 **Article VII. STUDENT PETITIONS AND REFERENDUMS**

41 **SECTION 1. PETITIONS**

42
43
44 (a) Students of the University of Arkansas at Monticello shall have full right to petition
45 the Student Government Association, UAM Assembly, or any other body, only via a
46 certified petition.
47
48

1 (b) A petition may be certified with majority signatures of the Election Commission. The
2 Election Commission shall not certify any petition that does not include: a specific stated
3 situation or problem to be brought to the attention of the body petitioning; and a logical
4 recommendation(s) for the body petitioning to address. A petition of the Senate shall not
5 need certification by the Election Commission.
6

7 **SECTION 2. REFERENDUMS**

8
9 (a) Students of the University of Arkansas at Monticello shall have full right to amend
10 this constitution and pass other Student Government Association legislation via a
11 referendum.
12

13 (b) To file a referendum, students must submit the proposed legislation to the Election
14 Commission and file for a certified petition, signed by one-third of the student body if a
15 proposed amendment, to call for referendum. The student must then obtain the signatures
16 of fifty students on a form provided by the Election Commission.
17

18 (c) Referendums shall be passed by only the student body by majority of votes cast. If the
19 referendum is a proposed amendment to this Constitution, said proposed amendment
20 shall have to be approved by the UAM Assembly and the University of Arkansas Board
21 of Trustees.
22

23 **Article VIII. RATIFICATION AND AMENDMENTS**

24 **SECTION 1. RATIFICATION**

25
26
27 This Constitution shall take effect immediately after the student body ratification by
28 majority of the students voting, approval of the UAM Assembly, and approval by the
29 University of Arkansas Board Of Trustees.
30

31 **SECTION 2. AMENDMENTS**

32
33 An amendment to this constitution may be proposed in two manners: (1) by a majority
34 vote of the Senate; or (2) by referendum by petition of one-third of the student body.
35 Amendments proposed by referendum must be submitted to the Senate in writing one
36 week prior to any vote. After the proposal has been completed and verified through the
37 Senate, the proposed amendment must be ratified b a majority vote of the student body
38 voting and approved by the UAM Assembly and the University of Arkansas Board of
39 Trustees.
40

1 This proposed Constitution was passed in Conference by Unanimous Consent of the members
2 present the twenty-sixth day of February in the year of our Lord two thousand nine, and the
3 institution of the University of Arkansas at Monticello the one hundredth. Let it be known that
4 this proposed Constitution shall be sent for approval of the University of Arkansas at Monticello
5 Student Government Association Senate, University of Arkansas at Monticello Student
6 Government Association President, student body of the University of Arkansas at Monticello, the
7 University of Arkansas at Monticello Assembly, and finally the Chancellor of the University of
8 Arkansas at Monticello.
